Reflections on Turning 40: The Ottawa Valley Health Libraries Association/ l'Association des bibliothèques de la santé de la vallée de l'Outaouais History Project

The Ottawa Valley Health Libraries Association (OVHLA)/ l'Association des bibliothèques de la santé de la vallée de l'Outaouais, originally the Ottawa-Hull Health Libraries Group, dates back to 1974. The Association was one of the first chapters of the Canadian Health Libraries Association/ Association des bibliothèques de la santé du Canada. The objective of this project was to collect, organize, and share our historical documents, and to create a timeline of the Association's important moments.

Methods

• Past and present OVHLA members were solicited to contribute historical records.

- Issues of the Journal of the Canadian Health Libraries Association (JCHLA) and *Bibliotheca medica Canadiana* were scanned to identify relevant information.
- Historical documents and artifacts including meeting minutes, chapter reports, membership lists, treasurer records, and photographs — were reviewed and prepared for archiving.
- Questionnaire-based interviews were conducted via email with six past-presidents and one long-standing OVHLA member to gather their reflections.
- Both the historical records and the interview responses were analyzed to develop a narrative review and timeline of the Association's significant moments.

Results

- Outcomes from the OVHLA history project include:
- A narrative review of the Association's history, published in JCHLA.
- A timeline of OVHLA's key achievements and submission of OVHLA's records for deposit in the Archives and Special Collections of the University of Ottawa.
